US Sailing Championship of Champions Regatta.

Myself, Lee and Tal, were fortunate to be selected to compete in the US Sailing Championship of Champions. It was held in Carlyle, Illinois and competed in Lightning Class boats. There were nineteen other crews who had won their North Americans, or Nationals or World Championships in their respective one design class.

The Carlyle Sailing Association is on a lake 70 miles east of Saint Louis, Missouri that is out in the middle of farm country. However, they have many one-design classes that total over 300 boats, and they are able to host an excellent regattas of this level.

During the three long days, 17 races were completed, in 45 degree temperatures. We had many "ski" layers on under the foul weather gear. After each race we would switch boats and quickly get ready for the

next starting sequence while checking out the new controls and repacking the spinnaker.

As a teenager, Lee grew up with a Lightning and has skippered or crewed in them many times since. Tal, who was a two time college sailing All American and spent four years doing a 470 Olympic campaign, was a good addition to the family team. With these two positions in very capable hands, all I had to do was get good starts, steer fast and find the favorable wind shifts.

In spite of very poor last race, that dropped us from 4th to 7th overall, we were quite satisfied with our overall performance. It was also a joy to sail with other family members, and to be very competitive against the best sailors in the country.
