## The Court and Ginny Dunn Memorial Trophy Endowed by The Dunn Family Presented by Court Dunn

I'd like to thank Talbott and Lee Ingram, as well as Joe, Tina and Ian Lauver for their help in getting me here to-day. Talbott was one who, as a kid, I always looked up to, and wanted to be able to sail just like he did. Joe, or Skipper as we called him then, I've known since he was born. His Mom and Dad, were some of our closest friends growing up, both of whom made such a difference in my own development as well as my brother and sister's. If I knew Joe and Carolyn were coming over for dinner and boat building I'd cancelled all my activities with friends. I'm really excited that young Joe, has picked up the flag.

I'm here to finally pay some sort of tribute to my late folks who passed within a month of one another, 8 years ago.

My Mom and Dad had several things that were very important to them and driving forces in their lives - family, obviously church, yacht club and the Comet Class, although I'm sure the order changed depending on the weekend and season.

My brother, sister and I have been looking for some way to recognize their efforts and contributions to the greater community since their passing. A few months ago, I was gazing at the plaque on a trophy sitting on my coffee table, one that my Dad won here at Lake Hopatcong in 1946, sailing a Comet with my cousin, Royce Peabody. At about the same time, I was on the Comet Class website, and found that the Internationals were going to be held here at Lake Hopatcong. This is where my family's love of the Comet Class began. It was a no-brainer! A trophy, bearing their name, with the permission of the Class, would recognize their commitment to an organization they loved. My brother Steve, sister Betsy and I would like to endow a trophy in their memory and honor.

That's why I'm here today. It began here for us, through my Dad, who spent his summers growing up and sailing right here at the Yacht Club. Subsequently, I spent many summers up here too, visiting my Great Aunt and Great Uncle and cousins who had a house and bungalow.

Dad got into Comets, during the many summers he stayed with his Aunt and Uncle here at the Lake, I guess sometime in the 30's and 40's, when he was a teen! Once we were around, Dad wanted us to have a similar experience, I think I was about 11 or 12. Even though money was a bit tight, Dad found Comet 2925 somewhere down on the Jersey Shore — Ocean City, I think — brought it

home and rebuilt it for my brother Steve and me! Our first regatta was the Junior Nationals, held at East Hampton YC, for which my brother and I were ill-prepared but the love of sailing and in particular Comets, was born!

Dad's method of teaching us to sail, was finding a heavy weather day, putting life jackets on us, and pushing the boat out to sea, (against the pleas of my Mom), watching us capsize a few times, right the boat, start laughing and doing it again. We learned pretty quickly how to keep the boat upright, even if we never learned how to go faster than someone else! Once we began sailing a bit more, Dad bought us another Comet 3488, which I sailed for a few years (very non-illustriously), finding a crew wherever I could (sometimes Mom against her will).

Dad then partnered with Joe Lauver, (with a lot of support from Mom and Carolyn Lauver) buying three Oberg-Branning hulls, molded from a Beaton hull, I think, 3853, 3854, and 3855 and finishing them together in our basement, one with a cedar deck, one with a plywood deck and one with a glass deck After that, and after my brother and I were gone from home, he bought a Lippincott (3975) which he sailed with my younger sister, Betsy, And then, once age crept up on him, he sold, or gave away all the Comets still in the garage or basement and retired to a bigger "cruiser", which he really loved!

In the middle of it all, and again, partnering with Joe Lauver, he started LTD Regatta boats, selling Lasers and hardware out of the garage. Although short-lived, the company did supply my brother and me with Lasers and with Comet hardware. My Dad did everything he could to keep boats, trailers (usually without trailer lights working), and cars, ready for the three of us, dropping in from college on a minute's notice, to fly off to some regatta. During one period, when we were all sailing, we double decked Comets on a trailer, throwing a third on the rooftop of an old station wagon.

Although I'm not sailing any more, the Comet Class will always occupy a wonderful memory of not just a great boat, but a great sailing family. Most importantly, it was the glue that held our family together, creating many wonderful family memories in all our trips to so many regattas, including many trips to Miami, for the Mid-winters. He absolutely loved the Comet Class and would do
